## Spring Raptor Migration Summary 2004

Five watchsites reported counts for spring 2004 (Tables 1 and 2). There was no count conducted this year at White Deer Ridge (Lycoming County). Count effort (hours of observation) for the five watchsites ranged from 122 to 372 hours for a total of 1352 hours. A total of 5,471 raptors representing 18 species was reported. The passage rate for all species for five sites ranged from 3.2 to 5.2 raptors per hour (average 4.0). Two Mississippi Kites (Ictinia mississippiensis) were seen at Hawk Mountain Sanctuary, and a Swallowtailed Kite (Elanoides forficatus) was seen at Rose Tree Park.

Comparing data among watchsites is difficult because of differences in count efforts. Allegheny Front and Tussey Mountain counted throughout all of March, whereas Rose Tree Park and Tuscarora Summit counted only during late March, and Hawk Mountain counted only two days that month. All the sites had good coverage in April. however only Allegheny Front and Hawk Mountain extended the counts into May.

### Composition of the flight

Broad-winged Hawks (Buteo platypterus) appeared at watchsites beginning in early April, peaking in the second half of the month, and making up 22% of the overall flight (range of 1-45%). Broad-winged Hawk numbers were followed closely by those Red-tailed Hawks (Buteo jamaicensis), which peaked in late March-early April and made up 21%

of the overall flight (range 10-35%). Broadwings were the most common species at Hawk Mountain, Rose Tree Park, and Tuscarora Summit. whereas Redtails were the most abundant species at Allegheny Front and Tussey Mountain.

Turkey Vultures (Cathartes aura) were the third most abundant species overall, making up 14% of the total count (range of 4.24%). Vultures were seen as early as February, with most individuals passing in March (Table 2). Sharpshinned Hawks (Accipiter striatus), which were seen in March and April, were the only other species that made up at least 10% of the overall flight.

At all sites, Ospreys (Pandion haliaetus) were first seen in late March, with the earliest sighting at Rose Tree Park on March 18, Osprey numbers peaked in the middle of April. For watchsites that also conduct autumn counts (i.e., all except Tussey Mountain), Ospreys and Northern Harriers (Circus cyaneus) are relatively more common overall in spring than they are in autumn, whereas Sharp-shinned Hawks are relatively less common overall in spring.

Eleven of the twelve Peregrine Falcons (Falco peregrinus), and thirteen of the fifteen Merlins (F. columbarius) reported, were seen between April 9 and 24. More than a third of the American Kestrels (F. sparverius) migrated in March. Among the earliest migrants to arrive in spring, more than 20% of Golden Eagles (Aquila

chrysactos) were seen in February, with Allegheny Front and Tussey Mountain accounting for all of these.

### Seasonal Highlights

Allegheny Front (Bedford) - The count started in late February and ended in early May. Two-thirds of the overall flight was made up of Turkey Vultures (peak count 23 on March 7 and 20), Sharp-shinned Hawks (17 on March 28 and April 17), Broad-winged Hawks (85 on April 17), and Red-tailed Hawks (34 on March 29). Season record counts included 10 Black Vultures (Coragyps atratus) (4 on March 28), 55 Northern Harriers (9 on April 16). 71 Cooper's Hawks (Accipiter cooperii) (12 on March 28), and 6 Rough-legged Hawks (Buteo lagopus) (2 on March 7). The Golden Eagle count (39; peak count of 5 on March 1 and 5) dropped from last spring, when 124 were counted. Other peak flights by species and date include Osprey (9 on April 18), Bald Eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus) (2 on March 1), Northern Goshawk (A. gentilis) (1 on five different dates) Red-shouldered Hawk (Buteo lineatus) (13 on March 7), American Kestrel (5 on April 16), and Merlin (3 on April 16).

Hawk Mountain Sanctuary (Berks and Schuylkill) - The peak of the spring flight was a 287-bird count (29% of the season's total) on April Included in that day's count were season-high counts of 9 Turkey Vultures, 4 Bald Eagles (a record single-day count), 18 Ospreys, 20 Sharp-shinned Hawks, 7 Cooper's Hawks, and 212 Broad-winged Hawks. The peak period of migration during the offical count (April 1 -May 15) was April 17 - 24, when nearly 90% of the season's Broadwinged Hawks passed, as did more than half the Ospreys and Northern Harriers, half the Bald Eagles, half the Sharp-shinneds, and 80% of the Percgrines. The Red-tailed Hawk flight peaked April 6 - 10. Mississippi Kites were seen on April

17 and April 23; the second and third spring records for the site. Season records (since 1998) were set for Bald Eagles (18), Northern Harriers (45; peak count of 7 on April 24), and Peregrine Falcons (5).

Rose Tree Park (Delaware) - The count began on March 15 and ended April 30 (with one day in February) and was highlighted by a Swallowtailed Kite on April 23, a rare bird for the state and the first record for the site. According to site coordinator Jim Lockyer, count effort was below average because of many snowy and rainy days, and resulted in the lowest total count and rate of passage (4.7 birds per hour versus average 9.5 birds per hour) in six years. The passage rate of American Kestrels (peak count 35 on April 9) was more than 6 times that of the average for all other sites. Twentyseven Red-tailed Hawks, a season high, were counted on April 7. On April 20, observers saw five Bald Eagles and 102 Broad-winged Hawks.

Tuscarora Summit (Fulton) - The count was the highest since spring counting began in 1994. Total counts for Osprey, Bald Eagle, Red-tailed Hawk, and Peregrine Falcon were well above average. This was the only site at which Ospreys (at 21%) made up more than 10% of the overall flight. Two days accounted for nearly 60% of the total Osprey count, with 55 of them on April 23 and 22 more on April 27. Season highs for Turkey Vultures (31 birds) and Red-tailed Hawks (25) came on March 26.

(Note a correction to Tuscarora Summit autumn 2003 data reported in *Pennsylvania Birds* 17:269-276: On November 3, 2003 there were 7 Turkey Vultures counted, not 7 Ospreys.)

Tussey Mountain (Centre) Species that migrate late in autumn
tend to arrive early in spring and
these species, particularly Turkey
Vultures, Red-tailed Hawks, and
Golden Eagles, were predominant at

Tussey Mountain. Peak flights of Golden Eagles occurred on February 29 (22 eagles) and March 6 (a recordtying 32 eagles), and the site averaged more than 4 Goldens per day in March, totaling 162 for the season. The peak period of migration for several species was March 24 -30, including season high counts on March 26 of 50 Turkey Vultures, 15 Sharp-shinned Hawks, 9 Cooper's Hawks, 112 Red-tailed Hawks, and 12 American Kestrels. Few Broadwinged Hawks were seen, but counts ended before peak migration occurred for the species.
