Autumn Raptor Migration Summary 2008 Laurie Goodrich

Autumn 2008 was a season of contrasts. Three migration watchsites reported above-average total raptor counts, and ten reported below-average totals. Five species exceeded their 2007 total by 10% or more, but 10 species dipped below 2007 tallies by more than 10%. Two sites dropped by 50% compared to 2007. A total of 108,146 migrant hawks of 19 species was tallied at the fourteen Pennsylvania watch sites, during a combined 1049 days and 7617 hours of coverage from 1 Aug through 1 Jan. Season highlights included two Mississippi Kites (Ictinia mississippiensis): adult, Hawk Mountain; immature, Little Gap; a Swainson's Hawk (Buteo swainsoni): juvenile-intermediate morph, Tree Park, and a Gyrfalcon (Falco rusticolus): immature/gray Little Gap (Table 2).

Fourteen hawk watches reported in autumn 2008 including four sites—Allegheny Front. Blue Mountain-Route 183, Buckingham, and Council Cup—not covered here in 2007 (Figure 1). Hours of coverage per site ranged from 51 to 1171. Days per site ranged from 7 to 141. The 2008 birds per hour ranged from 7.5 to 224.4 per site, with most sites ranging from 7.5 to 24 birds per hour. The average passage rate statewide was 14.55 birds per hour (Table 2).

As in the past, the Broad-winged Hawk (Buteo platypterus) was the most numerous migrant at all watch sites in 2008, comprising 51.6% of the flight. Sharp-shinned Hawks (Accipiter striatus) represented 19.1% of all migrants observed, and Red-tailed Hawks (Buteo jamaicensis) 11.1%. At

Buckingham, a one-week count site, 98% of the migrants recorded were Broad-winged Hawks; this compares to a range of 28% to 79% at other full-season sites. Five percent of the state's migrants were Turkey Vultures (Cathartes aura). Most other species each represented less than 3% of the combined flight.

Although the 2008 total passage rate was similar to 2007, individual species counts varied widely (Table 2). Higher 2008 counts were recorded for Black Vulture (Coragyps atratus) and Turkey Vultures (up 18% and 19%, respectively), Bald Eagle (Haliaeetus leucocephalus) (up 9%), Broad-winged Hawk (up 38%), Rough-legged Hawk (Buteo lagopus) (up 20%), and Golden Eagle (Aquila chrysaetos) (up 40%). The 2008 passage rates were notably lower for Osprey (down 29%), Northern Harrier (Circus cyaneus) (down 50%). Sharp-shinned and Cooper's hawks (Accipiter cooperii) (down 34% and 33%. respectively), Northern Goshawk (Accipiter gentilis) (down 54%). Redshouldered (Buteo lineatus) and Redtailed hawks (down 20% and 21% repectively), as well as the three falcons, American Kestrel (Falco sparverius) (down 26%), Merlin (Falco columbarius) (down 26%), Peregrine Falcon (Falco peregrinus) (down 14%). State-wide hours and count days were higher in 2008 (up 14% and 11% respectively), in large part due to the four additional sites. Individual site hours were reduced at seven sites and increased at four sites (>10% difference), and three sites reported similar hours of coverage between years.

Few records were set in 2008. although high counts were recorded at some sites. Our most abundant migrant, the Broad-winged Hawk, passed through the state in peak numbers from 11 to 20 September, with highest the totals recorded southeastern sites: Buckingham (7483 on 17 September), Militia Hill (4848 on 18 September), and Rose Tree Park (2017 on 16 September). See Table 1 and Figure 1. Mid-September was the to see Bald Eagles Pennsylvania as well; the highest oneday site tally for the state was made at Bake Oven Knob and Waggoner's Gap on 15 September, both recording 24 birds. Eight other sites reported their highest one-day total for Bald Eagles between 15 and 19 September, suggesting a big eagle flight state-wide during that week (Table 1). Western Pennsylvania watch sites took the lead for Golden Eagle counts, led by a oneday peak count of 34 Goldens at Allegheny Front 2 November, and 27 at Waggoner's Gap 22 November. Stone Mountain also weighed in with 15 Golden Eagles 21 November and 14 on 22 November. On 1 November, a stream of Golden Eagles took the Kittatinny Ridge route, with 11 counted at Little Gap and 12 at both Bake Oven Knob and Hawk Mountain. On 2 November, the birds appeared to continue their ridge flight; 10 were at Blue Mountain-Route 183, 13 at Second Mountain, and 25 at Waggoner's Gap (Table 1).

Allegheny Front (Somerset/Bedford) - Allegheny Front recorded 7485 migrants over 103 days of coverage from 15 August to 21 December, averaging 9.78 birds per hour. The total count was down 11% as a result of lower than average counts for several species. The site's largest one-day flight (all raptors) swirled past on 18 September, when 1133 Broad-winged Hawks and 1156 total hawks were counted. Golden Eagles are the most celebrated migrant raptor at this site, and the first week of November brought the bulk of the flight, including 34 on 2 November and 32 on 5 November, among a total of 109 for the week and 154 for the season. Aboveaverage counts were recorded for Bald Eagle and Golden Eagle (69, 154). and for Broad-winged Hawk (3887).

Bake Oven Knob (Lehigh) – Bake Oven's total count of 10,523 raptors in 103 days was down 30% despite setting a new site record for hours of effort at 916.8. A new site record was set for Bald Eagle (236), reflecting the continued upswing in this species. Golden Eagles and Black and Turkey vultures also flew past in above-average numbers (119, 280, 920 respectively). The Broad-winged Hawk count of 2992 and the Red-tailed Hawk count of 1501 represented the most notable decreases from their long-term average, both down more than 40%.

183 Blue Mountain/Route (Berks/Schuylkill) - In 2008, we welcome back a historical migration watch site to active duty. Route 183 watchers covered 31 days and tallied 2498 hawks, with the highest one-day count on 20 September when they tallied 663 hawks including 621 Broadwinged Hawks. The most abundant migrants for this site were Broadwinged and Sharp-shinned hawks, at 36% and 32% of the flight. The largest Sharp-shinned Hawk flight occurred on 4 October when 138 zoomed past, but 10 Golden Eagles on 2 November were a definite one-day highlight.

Buckingham-BWSEPT (Bucks) – The BWSEPT Broad-winged Hawk transect count has been whittled down to one remaining site, which this year recorded the highest count of Broadwinged Hawks in the state. 11.230, including a one-day peak of 7483 on 17 September. The total raptor count was 11,445 in seven days of coverage, and included 25 Bald Eagles and 3 Peregrine Falcons. The Broad-winged Hawk total well surpassed the average for this site of 2065.

Council Cup (Luzerne) — Another returning site in 2008 was Council Cup, where counters tallied 1418 hawks in 29 days of coverage, including 55 Bald Eagles and 399 Broad-winged Hawks. The largest one-day flight occurred 15 September with 288 migrants including 10 Bald Eagles. Similar to other sites, the Red-tailed Hawk total (323) was well below the historical average (757).

Hawk Mountain Sanctuary (Berks/Schuylkill) – Hawk Mountain tallied 12,219 hawks in 132 days, one of its lowest season totals on record. The total was 38% below the long-term average of 18.673 hawks, and the

second-lowest total recorded since 1971. Species falling below-average included Cooper's Hawk, Northern Goshawk, Red-shouldered, Broadwinged, and Red-tailed hawks, and American Kestrel, all of which were down at least 30%. In contrast, a new record was set for Bald Eagle (245), above-average counts recorded for Black and Turkey vultures (38, 357 respectively), Golden Eagle (136), and Peregrine Falcon (61). Highlights included 13 Peregrine Falcons on 2 October, and an adult Mississippi Kite that swooped over the ridge at 13:14 on 7 September.

Jack's Mountain (Mifflin) — Jack's Mountain recorded 1483 in 21 days of counts mostly in September. Counts and effort were down 60% from the long-term average. Broad-winged Hawks were the most numerous migrant with 1104 totaled and a peak of 419 on 14 September. Bald Eagles were seen daily from 11 to 19 September. including a high of 4 on 19 September.

Little Gap (Northampton) - This eastern Kittatinny Ridge site tallied 8605 total raptors of 17 species in 70 days of coverage. Both counts and effort were below the long-term average; however two exciting rarities made up for this deficit. An immature Mississippi Kite was spotted heading south above the ridge on 2 September. and on 26 November, an immature gray morph Gyrfalcon was sighted and subsequently trapped and released. Little Gap recorded its highest Bald Eagle count (18) on 15 September along with an early immature Golden Eagle. The highest one-day counts of the season, 1702 and 1632, were tallied on 17 and 18 September respectively, and included more than 1500 Broad-winged Hawks each day.

Militia Hill (Montgomery) – Renown for its Broad-winged Hawk flights. Militia Hill did not disappoint, recording 8504 Broad-wings among 10,763 raptors in 58 days of coverage, ending 31 October. The first notable flight circled past on 16 September with 2,834 Broad-winged Hawks and 9 Bald Eagles. On 18 September, the highest one-day count of 4848 Broadwings was tallied, mostly passing after 14:00. That same day saw a one-day peak count of 11 Bald Eagles. This day was the second-highest Broad-winged total for the state, and also the day

Militia Hill observers counted their 200,000th raptor in their site's history.

Rose Tree Park (Delaware) - Rose Tree tallied 6984 total raptors during 93 days of coverage. Broad-winged Hawks represented 57% of the flight, with 4004 counted in 2008. The rarest migrant, an immature intermediate morph Swainson's Hawk, glided overhead at 12:45 on 13 October. Other highlights included 2017 Broad-wings on 16 September, 4 Peregrine Falcons on 6 October, and 7 Bald Eagles on 9 November. The 2008 total of 24 Peregrine Falcons tied the site record set in 2006—another hopeful sign for this species.

Second Mountain (Lebanon) Watchers recorded 7006 hawks in 125 days of coverage for a 2008 season that was 29% below average. The highest one-day total occurred on 11 September when 681 Broad-wings were among 719 total raptors. The Golden Eagle count of 102 was the second-highest ever for this site, only surpassed by the 2006 count of 127. Other above-average tallies were Peregrine Falcon (32), Bald Eagle (127), and Black and Turkey vultures (397. 6f3). Other highlights were 7 Peregrines on 3 October and 13 Goldens on 2 November.

Stone Mountain (Huntington) - Stone Mountain recorded its second-highest total for Broad-winged Hawk. 1894, amid an overall total of 4109 hawks in an average season of effort of 64 days. Overall, many species were lower than average, with Northern Harrier (42) and Sharp-shinned Hawk (540) the lowest for this site since 1995 and the lowest since regular coverage began. Red-tailed Hawk counts were the lowest since 1996. Bald Eagles continued their state-wide upswing. south in above-average sailing numbers. Their final tally of 52 was the third highest ever recorded here. The third highest year also was tallied for Golden Eagle at 133, including back to back "eagle days" on 21 and 22 November when 15 and 14 were counted, respectively. Thirteen of the Goldens passed between 12:00 and 14:00 on the 21 November. Snow squalls often obscured views on 22 November, leading to speculation as to what Stone Mountain might have recorded if skies were clear.

Tuscarora Summit (Fulton) - Bald Eagles set a new record at Tuscarora Summit with 58 in 2008, including 6 on 19 September. The total site count of 3515 raptors fell short of the average of 4291, despite above-average coverage during 72 days. Black and Turkey vultures and Golden Eagle all surpassed site averages with 39, 413, and 43 counted respectively. Broadwinged Hawks formed the bulk of the flight with 1553 counted and a peak one-day flight of 390 on 15 September. Other notable flights included 100 Turkey Vultures on 30 October and 7 Golden Eagles on 3 November.

Waggoner's Gap (Cumberland) - The 2008 Waggoner's Gap total of 20,093 raptors was lower than in recent years, but above the long-term average of 19,205. Effort was also above-average this year: counters covered 141 days from the opening of the season on 1 August to its close on 31 December. In contrast to other sites, Waggoner's recorded above-average flights for seven species. Among these were Black and Turkey vultures (91, 1345), Bald Eagle (308), Sharp-shinned Hawk (6085). Broad-winged Hawk (7205), Golden Eagle (244), and Merlin (130). The Sharp-shinned Hawk and Merlin numbers were especially noteworthy at Waggoner's Gap, since counts of these species at other sites fell below average this year. Peak one-day counts of these

two species coincided on 16 October, with 631 Sharp-shins and 21 Merlins zipping by the Gap. Other season highlights included 24 Bald Eagles on 15 September, 1691 Broad-winged Hawks on 16 September, and 27 Golden Eagles on 22 November. Finally, as was the case at other sites, the Red-tailed Hawk count of 2693 dipped 38% below the long-term average.


